But, in my heart of hearts, I know that we did the best thing for him.

We gave him the final gift of love. As I write this, my 11-year-old Springer, Nukta, sleeps at my feet, resting his head on my foot.

Overall, he is exceedingly healthy for his age. A bum shoulder he can predict the weather with is his only complaint.

He is a true clown, loves everyone, but will not permit any human in the house when none of "his" humans are home.

The bottom of our pack, he will not tolerate ill-mannered

foster dogs. A real mudder outside, he has perfect manners inside.

This is the dog that got me "into" Springers. Because of him, I adopted Jeremy who got me "into" rescue in a way I had never imagined.

You could say that Nukta is MAESSR's godfather.

Without him, I might never have taken part in starting MAESSR. I wonder if I will be strong enough when Nukta needs me to be.

In this age of high-tech medical treatments, will I chase a miracle trying to keep him alive?

Or will I love him enough to let him go with dignity and comfort, saving him the pain of experimental treatments?

As I look down at my funny old man, I can only hope that I will again be wise enough to know when to give the final gift of love.

Misty's Story Adopted June 8, 2003

Misty had always known she wanted to live with the Kansiers. The stories were transmitted from dog to dog, whenever they got together about the big yard, the people there to serve every whim, and the space under their antique bed where dog surveillance was at its best but humans never knew. The only problem was that she was in Virginia Beach, hundreds of miles away from dog paradise in Silver Spring, MD. How would she get there? Misty had heard of the underground railroad during the Civil War and would use a similar route. First she had to find a person who would help her. She found that she was 12 years old, white, and deaf so they would put

her on death row. Then she would recruit an Army of Marys - Baker and McElhaney, to plan her escape. They would hide her in a foster home among a Yellow Lab and a German Shorthaired Pointer. The last step was using advanced technology and MAESSR to make her whereabouts known. The plan took about a month but went like clockwork and the heroine was able to reach her goal where Joann, Bill, Elizabeth and her doggy sisters Mandy and Chamois waited to give her kisses, clean her eyes and share their bed. The journey was tough but the rewards for all of us are worth it. I sometimes hear humans say, "In my next life I am coming back as..."

Well, let me tell you, in my next life I want to come back as Norman Cromwell minus the aches and pains of old age. My life is good.

I run around the dog park every morning with my friend, Olie. I cuddle up next to my sister, Kelly, while my mom is at work. And every afternoon my girlfriend, Dawn, comes to take me for a long walk. She is very nice to my



sister and me. But sometimes I can't walk as far or run as well because of my arthritis.

When I was relinquished by my owner, fostered and adopted, it was such a crazy time for me.

The doctor thinks that I had a lot of anxiety and, therefore, a lot of adrenaline keeping me going. When I finally started feeling comfortable in my new home, I discovered that I just couldn't walk. I went to the vet and he said that I had very severe arthritis. My arthritis had progressed past the stage of being helped by buffered aspirin.

I began to take a prescription drug called Etogesic. Almost immediately, I was able to walk without limping. However, Etogesic has some side effects in some dogs that my mommy wanted to avoid. She posted on the MAESSR listserv and I think every single member of the list wrote to her

with suggestions and encouragement (and more than a few hugs and kisses for me). The prevailing opinion was to put me on Glucosamine/Chondroitin.

Three days after I finished the Etogesic, I could not walk again. This time my mommy started me on Glucosamine/Chondroitin. The results have been nothing short of remarkable. I can run and play as well as the young punk dogs at the park on most days. Occasionally, I can't walk as far or run as well but those days are good days, too because I get extra attention.

So you see, my life, as a MAESSR Senior Dog is good. I highly recommend it to those of you senior dogs who are thinking about joining a MAESSR family.

The Training Corner

Training Treats

One of the most important elements of a good positive reinforcement training program is having great treats for your dog. Make your treats something really special that your dog only gets when you're training. If you use Milk Bones for your normal everyday treat, don't use them for training! Food is not a guaranteed motivator for all dogs, but it usually works well for our Springers since they're such notorious "chow hounds." Treats don't need to be big, just flavorful and enough of a reward to make your dog want to work. Try to pick something that's not too high in fat or calories. Our favorites are: turkey pepperoni (Hormel's has 70% less fat than regular pepperoni); low-fat beef hotdogs (cut into small pieces & microwaved); chicken (Purdue already cooked Shortcuts are great); cheese; or tablescraps (order the 12-oz prime rib instead of the 8-oz one, and bring the leftovers home!) If you have a training session where you use lots and lots of treats, reduce the amount you feed at mealtime that day. Use a variety of treats so your dog isn't sure just what he's going to get. Keep a container in the freezer with your training treats, and take out what you need for your training session. As your supply starts to get low, mix in a couple of new items. However, if you've made your treats so delectable and desirable that your dog can't concentrate on the task at hand, make your "trail mix" a little more mundane by mixing some of your dog's regular kibble.

Training Triumphs: Carol Mumbauer reports that **Paddington** finished his beginner obedience class with special recognition for "best effort."...**George Bennett** has learned what his family members consider a very useful trick: he retrieves the plastic golf balls they use during chipping practice in their back yard!...Teri Wiley's **Boomer (aka Quinn)** just completed basic agility training, and after some initial trepidation about the tunnel, really seemed to enjoy himself...Rob Pattison reports that both **Chance** and **Penny** have completed "Household Manners" classes, and Penny (Miss October on the 2003 calendar) is currently halfway through her first agility class...MAESSR boy **Sam** (with the help of his owner, Beth Anderson), recently completed his AKC Companion Dog (CD) title and will soon start working at the Open level...Gay Norton Edelman reports that obedience training has made a huge difference in her household's relationship with **Shadow II**. Shadow now knows that she has to earn her rewards, and that her jobs are to greet enthusiastically each family member as he or she enters the house; patrol the floors for stray crumbs; lie quietly in the kitchen doorway to supervise dinner prep; accompany family walkers on their journeys; and be there to receive hugs and pets...MAESSR volunteer Joy Sarnelli reports that ESSCLI rescue **Russell** earned his CGC in March, joining his ESS brothers Ricky and Reggie in becoming canine good citizens...Carol Alderman's **Mickey** just completed an obedience class, and is signed up for agility training. In his spare time, he has learned how to remove his sister **Daisy's** collar...Having all of these dogs do so well in their training is a fantastic advertisement for rescue in general and MAESSR in particular. ESSentials

“On the road again, just can’t wait to get on the road again..”

Yep, it’s that time of year again. Families are packing up their gear, beach chairs, sports equipment and heading to points unknown. But hey, what about the family dog? If he or she comes along, are you prepared? Here are just a few tips to keep your furry family member safe and comfortable as you head out.

1. Make sure you have a secure leash and collar with the license & nametag firmly attached.
2. Carry a photo of your pet in case you are separated.
3. Micro-chipping your dog can be done quickly at your vet. Vets, shelters and even police in some cases can scan this chip. A quick and efficient way to locate YOU!
4. Pack you dogs’ favorite blanket, toys, food and treats. Be sure to

bring water from home or use bottled water – guaranteeing you will always have water for your dog.

5. Take along any medication your pet needs and have your vet’s phone number handy.
6. If this is your pet’s first long car ride, work up to longer periods in the car BEFORE you leave, so your dog is prepared.
7. Designate a special spot in the car for your pet or use a crate to keep them safe & secure. Make sure there is enough room for your dog to stand up, turn around and lay comfortably.
8. **NEVER, NEVER, leave your pet ALONE in a parked vehicle.** People and kids have been known to tease ani-mals, even break windows and let the dog run free! Take turns sitting with your pet in shady spots, it’s a great time to play one on one.
9. Clean up after your dog, no matter where you are. It’s the RIGHT thing to do.

10. Plan ahead. Make sure the hotels, motels, parks, and even Grandma is OKAY with pets!

Here are just a few places to contact as you set your vacation plans in motion: Motel 6 and Super 8 allow pets at most of their properties. Holiday Inn, Ramada, and Red Roof Inns allow pets on a property-by-property basis. If you are an AAA member you can call and ask AAA for a travel book. It will list AAA hotels allowing pets.
